



**BETWEEN 6:00 AM—9:00 AM: A DEATH CONFIRMED**

Last week in Joel Moment, Pastor Jaime talked briefly about his dad. They shared a strong love, despite his father’s troubles and weaknesses. Jaime also said something that caught my attention and changed my calendar for the week. He shared that when he visited his dad’s grave, he lost control of his emotions. He wept and couldn’t stop. I guess there’s something about being face to face with a grave marker that strips away our defenses. The truth is that death is as unyielding as a granite stone. Standing at a burial site makes that fact clear and undeniable.

Now for the change in my calendar. Jaime’s experience prompted me to visit my grandmother’s grave at Gate of Heaven Cemetery in Los Gatos. I did so last Friday. The stone my mother bought for Helen Louise Sled (1922-2012) is pictured to the right. When I drove up to the plot, there was a graveside service going on 15 feet from my grandmother’s plot. I didn’t want to disturb the gathering so I sat in my car until it was over. I watched the mourners file past the casket as each left a rose. Then the Gate of Heaven staff lowered it into the ground. I was moved as I saw their fresh grief.

However, what struck me the most about the scene was the body language of the officiating pastor. I couldn’t hear him, but I could tell he was preaching. What impressed me was how he held the Bible. It was a large, leather-bound copy and it rested open on his two palms, like in the stock photo to the right. He held it with true reverence. I could tell that the words meant much to him.

Death is only manageable if we interpret it from the perspective of an open Bible, which talks about how the bleakness of death can be transformed. In the Bible reading today, we’ll learn about Jesus’ own death and burial. It’s an aspect of his successful mission that we don’t want to skip over as we rush to the third-day surprise. We want to feel the sharp pinch of separation — a sting like that felt by those who prepared his body and laid it in the tomb.

In Kierra’s depiction of Gospel Event #5 on the following page, we see what happened after Jesus gave up his spirit. Read the Scriptures and identify the people and the actions they took.



**Matt. 27:57** *When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who also was a disciple of Jesus.*

**Matt. 27:58** *He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate ordered it to be given to him.*

**Mark 15:44** *Pilate was surprised to hear that he should have already died. And summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he was already dead.*

**GROUP PRAYER PROMPT #1 (7 min.):** *Psa. 116:3 The snares of death encompassed me;*

**GROUP PRAYER PROMPT #3 (7 min.):** *Mal. 3:16 Then those who feared the LORD spoke with one another. The LORD paid attention and heard them,*

Let's pause and let each person share a concern with the rest of the group. It can be a personal matter or something related to our church, community or nation. But listen to each other and then cast those concerns on the strong arms of the Lord.
